Brutalism in Colour

Project Statement:

Within this project I want to look at 'unwelcoming', Brutalist style architecture juxtaposed against classically refined, colourful, contemporary European architecture. I will take primary research from the concrete city around me and use creative platforms to source my secondary information. Throughout material exploration and testing knitted structures I hope to combine the two design concepts into my one idea.

Body of Work:

Throughout this project I plan to create physical development of knitted designs, but curate a digitally based sketchbook/portfolio. I want to try and work with the physical designs to create visually exciting digital pages that show progression of the ideas and themes throughout. I want the concept and context to be very apparent all through the work, so the body of work feels refined to the audience. I also intend to make twelve final fabric samples that I will photograph and put into the digital sketchbook

Research:

I plan to do mainly visual research throughout this project as I really want to give a refined concept. I want to take inspiration from architectural design, fashion design, garment construction and yarn qualities. I want to understand how yarns work in order to produce more structural knitted designs that would also work well when on the body.

Challenges:

My main challenge throughout this project will be having to complete my work from home. Using a domestic machine means knitting in a different way. I will have to adapt my ideas to the resources that are available to me. I plan to do lots of material exploration to help me adapt my project efficiently.

Future Intentions:

As it stands I'm not sure I want to go down the designer route. I want to work within Museums and Galleries, curating exhibitions and making 'art' accessible to all. I plan to use this project to develop my skills in refining ideas, understanding concepts and contexts and understanding how to structure my time efficiently.

Context:

For this project I plan to focus on a full fashion context. I want to work towards a 'ready-to-wear' context, so the garments feel more relatable for the audience. I want to focus on creating an identity within the knitted fabrics that represents the places I am basing them off. The colours and yarns types used throughout will be influenced by my architectural research.

“**Brutalist buildings** are characterised by their massive, monolithic and ‘**blocky**’ appearance with a **rigid geometric style** and large-scale use of poured concrete. The movement began to decline in the 1970s, having been much criticised for being **unwelcoming** and inhuman.”

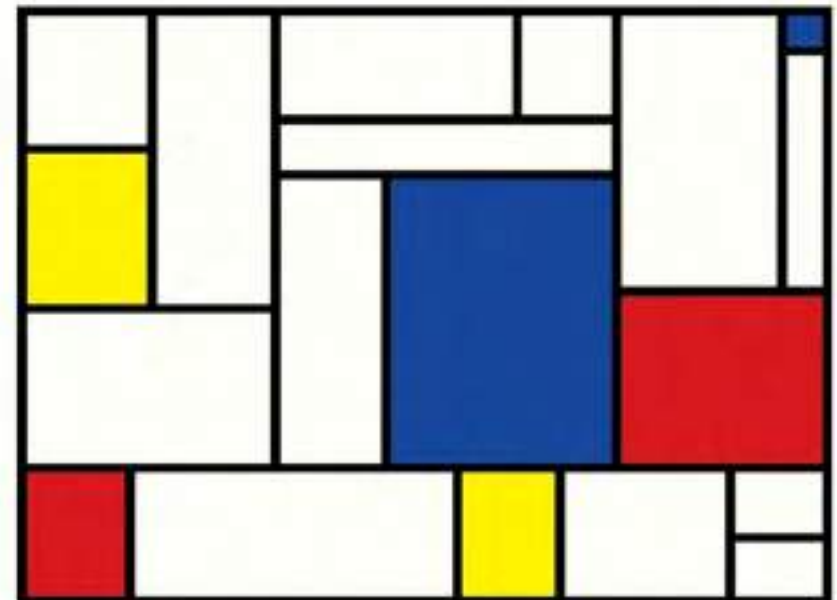

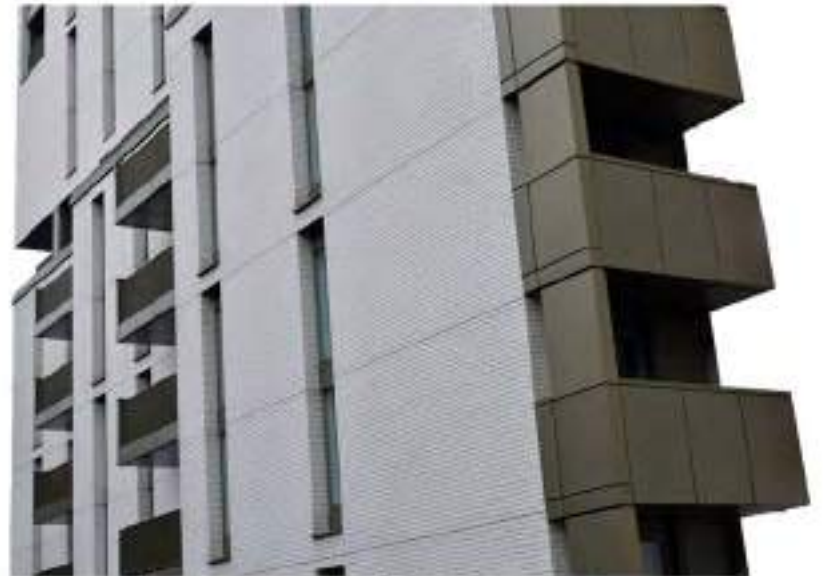


The Netherlands-based **De Stijl movement** embraced an **abstract, pared-down aesthetic** centered in basic visual elements such as **geometric forms** and **primary colors**.

Led by the **painters Theo Van Doesburg** and **Piet Mondrain** - its central and celebrated figure – De Stijl artists applied their style to a host of media in the fine and applied arts and beyond.

De Stijl's influence was perhaps **felt most noticeably in the realm of architecture**, helping give rise to the international style of the **1920s and 1930s**





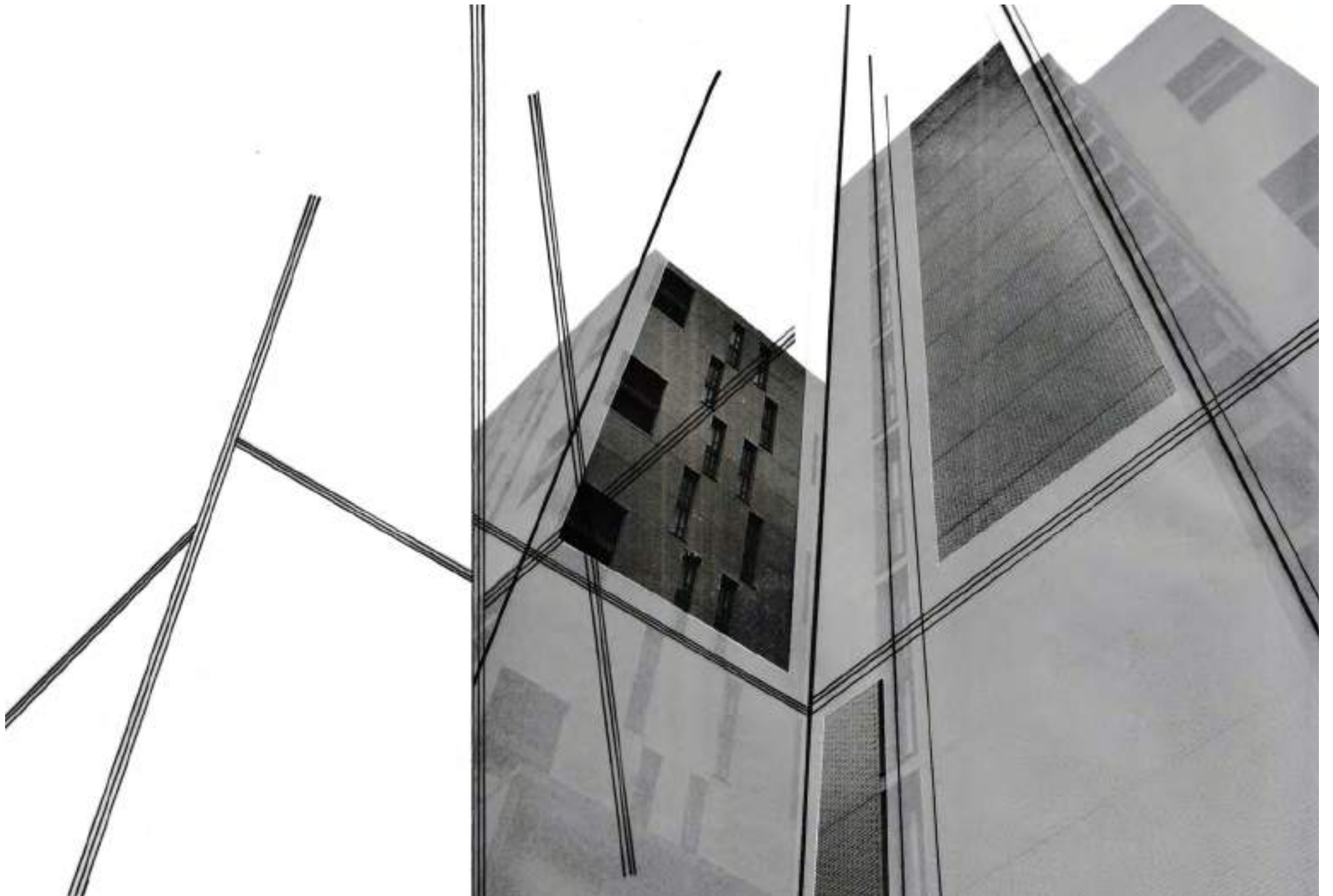
